Your kitten's vaccine program will depend on the age and previous vaccine history. This is some information on feline vaccines and testing.

Feline Distemper vaccine

Feline distemper (FVRCP) begins at 6 weeks of age, and boosters are given 3-4 weeks apart until 16 weeks old. It protects against the following diseases:

- Panleukopenia: Panleukopenia is characterized by fever, poor appetite, vomiting, and diarrhea. Panleukopenia can be fatal.
- Rhinotracheitis: Rhinotracheitis is a highly contagious respiratory disease and is characterized by sneezing, fever, and inflamed eyes.
- Calicivirus: Calicivirus is a highly contagious respiratory disease similar to rhinotracheitis.
- Pneumonitis (chlamydia): Pneumonitis is another respiratory infection that may cause pneumonia.

Feline Leukemia vaccine

Feline leukemia vaccine begins at 10 weeks of age, and boosters are given in 3-4 weeks and then annually after. Feline leukemia can be fatal and highly contagious. It is characterized by fever, anemia, and swollen lymph nodes. A blood test should be done before vaccinating.

Feline Leukemia and Feline AIDS Testing

Feline leukemia and feline AIDS testing is a blood test that can be done starting at 12 weeks of age. It is recommended before vaccinating.

Rabies vaccine

The rabies vaccine is given to kittens at 12 weeks of age or older. Rabies is a serious and fatal disease that attacks the brain and central nervous system. This vaccine is made from a killed rabies virus. The first vaccine is good for one year, and then it will be given every three years.

Ova, Parasites, & Giardia Testing

Having your cat's stool checked is very important, and it is recommended that there be at least two negative samples for kittens and then annually after. Most kittens have worms. The most common ones are hookworms, tapeworms, roundworms, whipworms, and coccidian. All worms attack the intestines.

Neuters & Spays

Neutering and spaying your kitten is important and recommended at 6 months of age or older. Your pet will generally have fewer health problems and a better temperament in the future.

Microchipping

A microchip is inserted under the skin of your pet. This is not painful and can give you peace of mind if your pet is lost and put in a shelter. We recommend microchipping at time of spay

Ear Mites

Ear mites are parasites located in the ears. Ear mites can cause ear and skin diseases, which can spread to other pets. Having an ear swab done can determine whether your cat is infected with ear mites.

Flea & Tick Prevention

Flea & tick prevention is highly recommended. There are topical flea & tick preventatives that come as a liquid that is applied to your cat's skin. There are also oral flea & tick preventatives. Flea & tick preventatives can be started at 8 weeks of age or older.

Heartworm testing for outdoor cats is recommended at 6 months of age. Heartworm disease can be fatal and is transmitted by infected mosquitos.
